Arranging Hymns and Scriptures

Breaking into groups, you will be given a theme. Work together to arrange a collection of 4 hymns and 2 Scripture readings that match your theme. Then put them into a logical order for use.

## Suggestions:

1. Reference the *Topical Index*, but don't feel limited to it.

2. Try to pick songs that are familiar to the group. Worship is a difficult time to learn new songs on the spot.

#### Other exercises:

- 1. Select a series of hymns that work through a chapter of the Bible, or a book of the Bible. Examples:
  - The book of Philippians, 2 hymns per chapter
  - Romans chapter 12, 6 hymns
  - Songs from the Psalms
- 2. Look back through the sermon topics from the last month and select 2-3 songs for each topic (this can be very hard, depending on the sermon!)
- 3. Pick a hymn to sing by yourself or with your family in the morning and/or evening.
- 4. Select hymns that form a progression. Examples:
  - A series of hymns that works through the life of Christ
  - A series of hymns looking back at the past, around at the present, and then forward to the future
  - A series of hymns that describes different points in our Christian walk: conversion, trials, relief, death
- 5. What other ideas can you think of?

# Things to Consider:

- Select a theme / Fit part of worship (LS, sermon, etc.)
  - Start with strong, familiar song, build logically
- Individual song:
  - Does the song teach truth?
  - Are the words or music too difficult?
  - Are we familiar with it?
- Leading worship:
  - Appropriate comments
  - Pitch / beat time start and stop together
  - Appropriate speed & energy
  - Announcements / transitions in worship

# Pitching the Song

# Step 1: Find the Key / "DO"

No b's (flats) or #'s (sharps) = **C** 


1 b = **F** Fat 1 # = **G** Girls 2 b's = **Bb** Boys 2 #s = **D** Don't 3 b's = **Eb** Eat 3 #s = **A** Always 4 b's = **Ab** Apples, 4 #s = **E** Eat

 $5 \text{ b's} = \mathbf{Db}$  Dumplings  $5 \# s = \mathbf{B}$  Breakfast

6 b's = **Gb** & Gravy 6 #s = **F#** First

This note will always be "DO."

Blow the "DO" note on the pitch pipe:




# Step 2: Find the Starting Note for the Melody (DO, MI, or SOL)

Learn these 3 shapes:


2. MI = (diamond, for me?)

# **Keeping Time**

Make sure to stand where you can be easily seen so everyone can follow along.

#### Step 1: Find the Beat

Time is kept by holding your hand out about shoulder level and moving your hand up and down.

Listen carefully to the song and move your hand <u>down</u> when there is a beat.

### **Step 2: Starting the Song**

Find the first beat of the song.

To begin, move your hand up as you breathe in, then begin singing as you bring your hand down on the first beat.

## Step 3: Finishing the Verse or Song

At the end of a verse, hold your hand still until you are ready to start the next verse.

On the very last note of the song, hold your hand still to show how long to hold the note. Then make a small circle and/or close your hand to finish the note.

Side note: watch for fermatas ("bird's eye").

This means the leader decides how long to hold the note.

When you reach the note under the fermata, hold the note like Step 3 above.

#### Volume:

You can indicate that a song should be louder by increasing how far up/down you move your hand. The more motion, the more volume. The less motion, the less volume.

#### **Exercises:**

- How fast or slow would you lead "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus"?
- How fast or slow would you lead "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross?"
- What about a song like "Christ Arose"? Do you change speed?
